ADVENT DEVOTIONS

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The four weeks leading up to Christmas can be an especially rich time of reflection and meditation upon the birth of our Lord. These *Advent Devotions* are designed to focus the Christian's attention upon Christ and off of the materialism and commercialism surrounding the American celebration of Christmas.

Using an advent wreath, each of the four weeks leading up to Christmas will focus upon one of Christ's names revealed at His birth in the following passages:



"And the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid; for behold, I bring you good news of a great joy which shall be for all the people; for today in the city of David there has been born for you a 'SAVIOR, who is ²CHRIST the ³LORD'" (Luke 2:10-11). "And she will bear a Son; and you shall call His name Jesus, for it is He who will save His people from their sins.' Now all this took place that what was spoken by the Lord through the prophet might be fulfilled, saying, 'Behold, the virgin shall be with child, and shall bear a Son, and they shall call His name ⁴IMMANUEL' which translated means, 'God with us'" (Matthew 1:21-23).



Buy or construct a wreath and place four candles (red, purple, gold and green) spaced evenly around the wreath with a white candle in the center. These candles will be used to represent names of Christ and corresponding attributes. During your daily family devotion time, light the candle (and all previous weeks' candles), and then read the daily devotion. On December 24th and 25th light all the candles as well as the candle in the center. Have your children learn what each of the candles represent.



EAR Christian, is Jesus' birth "good news of a great joy" to you? Some may think that is a silly question to ask a Christian. But is it? Look into the mirror. Be honest, what do you see -- "great joy" -- or something else? Perhaps you see someone who is not necessarily overjoyed, but a pretty good person nonetheless. Christian, have you forgotten who you are? - a sinner, saved by grace! Let me approach all of this from another direction. Do you know why so many Christians don't evangelize, don't share the Gospel, don't even tell their own family and friends about Christ? O there are many excuses, but the primary reason is this: We don't see what big sinners we are. But find a man who understands a bit of his own depravity (Rom. 3:10-18), the eternal damnation his sins deserve (Rom 6:23), and the glory of God's grace in the birth, life, and substitutionary death of Christ, and you will see a man filled with "good news of a great joy" which he feels compelled to tell. He understands himself to be a great sinner and hence Christ a great Savior. Yes, God sent His only-begotten Son into the world to "save His people from their sins" (Mt. 1:21). To the self-righteous, that is hardly newsworthy, but it is "good news," great news, headline news to those who understand the depth of their sinfulness (Mt. 21:31)! Jesus said, "I have not come to call the [self] righteous, but sinners" (Lk. 5:29-32). Sinners need a Savior and great sinners need a great Savior! The apostle Paul wrote, "It is a trustworthy statement, deserving full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save *sinners*, among whom *I am foremost of all*" (1 Tim. 1:15). The truth of the matter is that all of us are *great* sinners (Rom. 3:23), but to those who cannot accept this, Christ is a little Savior, the cross a little cross, salvation a meager thing, and Jesus' birth just cute Christmas card material. Without a clear grasp of these three – one's own sinfulness (Rom. 3:23), the eternal penalty of sin, and the free gift of eternal life in Christ Jesus (Rom. 6:23) – we can never fully appreciate Christmas. These are themes we dare not dwell on too little. Begin today to prepare your heart for Christmas by meditating on this: Jesus is a great Savior who atoned for the great transgressions of *great* rebels. This is truly "good news of a great joy!"





MAGINE a bridge spanning the Atlantic Ocean, connecting America to Europe, 4500 miles long, over waters at an average depth of 10,000 feet! As much of an engineering impossibility as that may be, such a distance is trivial compared to the infinitely broad separation between God and man, because of sin (Isa. 59:2). It is an impassable gulf than none can forge, but One – Jesus Christ. Many have tried, through one man-made religion or another, but all "fall short" (Rom. 3:23). Christ was born in Bethlehem to span the gap. That little baby was a bridge to eternal life. His birth set the beams, His perfect life hung the supports, but it was His death on the cross that paved the road. Dear friend, you can stand with confidence upon Him. He is a tested trestle, a bridge of proven strength and He will bear you up. Apart from Jesus Christ nothing can join us to God, we are completely cut off; but of those who hope in Christ, the opposite is true – nothing can separate us from God:

"Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? ... For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other created thing, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord." – Romans 8:35.38-39

The incarnation marks Christ's descent from Heaven, like a drawbridge descending across a bottomless pit (Rev. 9:1-2). There is *one* bridge (Acts 4:12), albeit a narrow bridge (Mt. 7:13-14), but a bridge nonetheless! – And not a toll bridge, for all who wish may freely cross! (Rom. 6:23). But you must forsake all futile notions of getting across any other way and trust in Christ alone! Jesus said, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father, but through Me" (Jn. 14:6).







VERY day thousands of babies are born. Some will grow up to become doctors and save innumerable lives from sickness and disease. Others are born who will grow up and save people from burning buildings, rescue people at sea, liberate hostages, deliver food to the starving, and risk their lives to snatch helpless victims from the jaws of death. But only One was ever born who can save people from their sins and that is Jesus Christ. The Lord said, "I, even I, am the Lord; and there is no Savior besides Me" (Isa. 43:11). "There is no other God besides Me, a righteous God and a Savior; there is none except Me" (Isa. 45:21). "For there is one God, and one Mediator also between God and men, the man Christ Jesus" (1 Tim. 2:5). The angel said to Joseph, concerning Mary, "And she will bear a Son; and you shall call His name Jesus, for it is He who will save His people from their sins" (Mt. 1:21). Yes, He and He alone is able to save us from sin. If I call 9-1-1, any number of people might respond; but if, despairing of my sins, I cry out for salvation, only One can come to my rescue, that is Christ. As lowly a place as a manger is to lay the Savior of the world, there was only room there for one Savior. This one, and this one alone, is the only Savior and Redeemer of men's souls. "And there is salvation in no one else; for there is no other name under heaven that has been given among men, by which we must be saved" (Acts 4:12). So then, Christmas is a celebration of one birth above all others, the One who was born to save men from the present power and the eternal penalty of sin. We cannot lose this one birth among the billions of others, for this one is distinct. Prepare your heart now, that the gifts and festivities of Christmas would not steal your attention away from the One who is truly worthy of all of our devotion. "Turn your eyes upon Jesus," as the song says, the one Savior from sin.











NE day Jesus said to a man, "Friend, your sins are forgiven you." And the scribes and the Pharisees began to reason, saying, 'Who is this man who speaks blasphemies? Who can forgive sins, but God alone?" (Lk. 5:20-21). The scribes and the Pharisees rightly understood that only God can forgive sins, but what they failed to recognize or perhaps refused to admit was Jesus is God, Immanuel, "God with us" (Mt. 1:23), who alone is invested with authority to forgive sins. Certainly there is no shortage of man-made religions today which offer forgiveness of sins: "Do good works," they tell us, "Perhaps the scales will be tipped in your favor." Men in fancy robes hear the confessions of their parishioners, wave their hands, and magically absolve them of their sins, but it is a charade for only God can forgive sin! Even the spiritually blind scribes and Pharisees understood that much. Christ alone is invested with such authority. "I, even I, am the One who wipes out your transgressions for My own sake; and I will not remember your sins" (Isa. 43:25). "For there is one God, and one *Mediator* also between God and men, the man Christ Jesus" (1 Tim. 2:5), "in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins" (Col. 1:14). Christ is our Priest; He and He alone. Only He can forgive you of your sins. He alone has the authority. Your "good" works cannot absolve you (Isa 64:6; Rom 3:28; Gal. 2:16; Eph. 2:8-9; 2 Tim. 1:9), no earthly priest can pardon you (1 Tim 2:5; Lk. 5:21), and no amount of penance will wash away your guilt (1 Sam 15:22; Isa 1:13-14). But the "good news" of the Gospel is that "there has been born for you a Savior, who is Christ the Lord" (Lk. 2:10-11), who "has authority on earth to forgive sins" (Mt. 9:6). So then, "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and righteous to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (1 Jn. 1:9). "For Thou, Lord, art good, and ready to forgive, and abundant in lovingkindness to all who call upon Thee" (Psa. 86:5).










UR advent devotions bring us now to the topic of gift-giving – not the exchange of gifts that has become a traditional part of the secular celebration of Christmas, but rather God's gift of His Son. Several characteristics of gift-giving are worth noting in this regard. First, a gift must be the initiative of the giver; that is, it must be voluntarily given, otherwise it is not a gift. With this in mind, we turn our thoughts to the gift of God's Son, initiated in the mind of God, "before the foundation of the world" (1 Pet. 1:19-21), "by the predetermined plan and foreknowledge of God" (Acts 2:23). God's gift of His Son, the incarnation, Jesus' birth in Bethlehem, His life, and His death on the cross were planned by God before the fall of mankind, before the Creation of the world, before anything! "O, the depth of the riches both of the wisdom and knowledge of God! How unsearchable are His judgments and unfathomable His ways!" (Rom. 11:33). Second, we look at the value of God's gift. Most of us are familiar with the old adage, "It's the thought that counts." What then, of a gift upon which the infinite mind of God has thought from all eternity! But God's gift of His Son is more than an infinitely precious thought – it is also of infinite cost and "surpassing value" (Phil. 3:8), for "you were not redeemed with perishable things like silver or gold ... but with precious blood, as of a lamb unblemished and spotless, the blood of Christ" (1 Pet. 1:18-19). Thirdly, look at the motive behind the gift. Of God's gift we read: "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life" (Jn. 3:16). God gave His Son "because of His great love with which He loved us" (Eph. 2:4). Finally, we note the free nature of the gift to its recipients. God gave His Son as a "free gift" to His people as an atonement for their sins (Rom. 5:15,16, 6:23). This Christmas, when you give gifts to one another, never forget the greatest gift ever given, with the greatest forethought ever made, initiated within the infinitely loving heart of God, and bought at the most expensive price ever paid.








HE angel announced to Joseph, who was betrothed to Mary, "And she will bear a Son; and you shall call His name Jesus, for it is He who will save His people from their sins" (Mt. 1:21). Herein lies the *purpose* Christ came into the world: to "save His people from their sins" (cf. 1 Tim. 1:15). This He would perfectly accomplish, for our passage says, He will do it. Christ did not die on the cross to make all men potentially savable, that those who choose to believe, by the sheer exertion of their will, would be saved. No, He came to seek and to actually save (Lk. 19:10). Listen friend, if it were left up to you and I to choose God, none of us would be saved! "There is no one who seeks for God" (Rom. 3:11). Aware of our helpless condition, God sent His Son, not potentially to save men, but to actually save them; that is, to render certain the salvation of His people (Jn. 6:37-40, 10:28-29) whom He chose (Jn. 15:16) before the foundation of the world (Eph. 1:4). Those trapped in a burning building do not need one who could hypothetically rescue them, or one who has the potential to save them, but one who will actually go in and pull them out of the flames. Much more then, those in danger of the eternal fires of hell need, not a theoretical savior, but One who actually saves. The ugly reality of sin requires a real salvation that is neither potential, theoretical, nor hypothetical. Actual sin requires an actual Savior. Christmas then, is a reminder that God's redemptive plan is in progress – "at the right time, God sent forth His Son, born of a woman ... in order that He might redeem those who were under the Law, that we might receive the adoption as sons" (Gal. 4:4-5). "Therefore, brethren, be all the more diligent to make certain about His calling and election of you" (2 Pet. 1:10). Having done that, "Let us draw near with a sincere heart in full assurance of faith ... Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for He who promised is faithful"





Savior: Red Candle

ERTAINLY you understand that the gifts you bought last Christmas have no merit this Christmas. If you don't think that is true, try wrapping them up and giving them again! But Jesus is the gift that keeps on giving. "God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son..." (Jn. 3:16). The value of earthly gifts fades away, but who can calculate the present value of Christ, who, once received, loses not His luster or newness, but increases in His effect over a lifetime! We are short-sighted if we view salvation as complete upon conversion; that is only our "introduction by faith into this grace in which we stand" (Rom. 5:2). Dear friend, Jesus has much more to give. Has He released you from the past penalty of sin (justification)? Good! Then let Him work on the present power of sin in your life (sanctification), "For sin shall not be master over you, for you are not under law, but under grace" (Rom. 6:14). You would never think of opening only part of a gift and leaving the rest unwrapped, would you? Then do not be satisfied with your justification, there is much more to unwrap! There is something new for you today! "The Lord's lovingkindnesses indeed never cease, for His compassions never fail. They are new every morning" (Lam. 3:22-23). This is the present effect of salvation: deliverance from the love of sin, rescue from the habit of sin, setting free from the desire of sin – not once, but daily! Yes, Jesus keeps on giving, and keeps on saving. Let Him improve upon your sanctification. Earthly gifts will never satisfy (Isa. 55:1-2), but Christ can meet the deepest longings of your heart. Christian, this Christmas, "kindle afresh the gift of God which is in you" (2 Tim. 1:6).







ND in the same region there were some shepherds staying out in the fields, and keeping watch over their flock by night. And an angel of the Lord suddenly stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them; and they were terribly frightened. And the angel said to the shepherds in the field, 'Do not be afraid; for behold, I bring you good news of a great joy which shall be for all the people; for today in the city of David there has been born for you a Savior, who is Christ the Lord" (Lk. 2:8-11). From birth, Jesus was identified as the Christ which means the Anointed One. Notice, this is no worldly speculation, but a heavenly announcement, "Christ, the Anointed One, is born!" That Jesus is the Christ was "news" to men, but ancient history to these angels who proclaimed it. In Jewish culture the ancient Hebrews anointed their prophets (1 Kgs. 19:16), priests (Ex 30:30), and kings (1 Sam. 10:1, 16:13) with oil for their respective offices. These three offices governed all of life in Hebrew society: prophets governed the moral life of God's people, priests governed religious practice, and the king governed civic duties and responsibilities. Likewise, Christ was anointed with the Holy Spirit (Mt. 3:16; Acts 10:38), of whom oil is merely a symbol, as the *final Prophet* in the likeness of Moses (Deut. 18:15; Acts 3:19-24), the *final Priest* in the order of Melchizedek (Heb. 3:1, 4:14, 7:1-8:6), and the *final King* in the line of David (Lk. 1:32-33). So then, when Christ comes into a life He comes to govern all of life as Prophet, Priest, and King. Dear friend, look again into the manger. What do you see - a baby? Yes, this Christmas adore Him again as a baby, but obey Him as your Governor, for He is "the Christ appointed for you" (Acts 3:20) and He has come to govern every aspect of your life.










Christ: Purple Candle

ESSIAH is the Old Testament Hebrew equivalent of the New Testament Greek word Christos (Christ), meaning "Anointed One". Jesus is "the Christ" (Mt. 16:15-16), the Messiah. "I am He!" Jesus said (Jn. 4:26). But Israel's hopes for a Messiah had degraded throughout Old Testament history into merely a desire for a warrior prince that would deliver them from foreign domination and reestablish Israel as a world power. By the time Christ came, Israel was not nearly as interested in deliverance from the yoke of sin, as in deliverance from Roman rule. Throughout Jesus' earthly ministry He sought to wean the disciples away from such notions and explain to them that God's predetermined plan was not for Messiah to set up an earthly kingdom, but to die on the cross for the sins of His people (Acts 2:23). This year as we approach Christmas, what is your interest in Christ? Are you as interested in Him delivering you from your present sins, as fulfilling all of your wants and desires? "Repent therefore and return, that your sins may be wiped away, in order that times of refreshing may come from the presence of the Lord; and that He may send Jesus, the Christ appointed for you" (Acts 3:19-20). For thousands of years, Israel hoped, waited, and prayed that Messiah would come, but when He did they missed it! And what of us? We look forward to the day that commemorates His birth, yet we ought to reexamine our motives for doing so, lest Christ be lost amidst the festivities, and we suffer a Christless Christmas, i.e. X-mas! The world may have X'd Christ out, but we must not be so irreverent. It is trite but true: Jesus is the reason for the season.

"Repent therefore and return, that your sins may be wiped away, in order that times of refreshing may come from the presence of the Lord; and that He may send Jesus, the Christ appointed for you, ... Moses said, 'The Lord God shall raise up for you a Prophet like me from your brethren; to Him you shall give heed in everything He says to you. And it shall be that every soul that does not heed that prophet shall be utterly destroyed from among the people. And likewise, all the prophets who have spoken, from Samuel and his successors onward, also announced these days." – Acts 3:19-20, 22-24

OR today in the city of David there has been born for you a Savior, who is Christ the Lord" (Lk. 2:10-11) – No greater words than these have graced the lips of angels! Christ, the Messiah, the anointed Prophet, Priest and King in One, had arrived! In all His offices He had no successor. He is called "The Prophet" (Jn. 6:14, 7:40), for He is the final Prophet to mankind: "God, after He spoke long ago to the fathers in the prophets in many portions and in many ways, in these last days has spoken to us in His Son" (Heb. 1:1-2). "All the prophets who have spoken, from Samuel and his successors onward, also announced these days" (Acts 3:24, cf. 10:43). The last was John the Baptist, who declared, "He [Christ] must increase, but I must decrease" (Jn 3:30). The prophet's job was to point to Christ, and when Christ arrived, their job was done. They prophesied the Word, but Jesus is the Word (Greek: Logos), the final Word of God to man (Jn. 1:1-2; Rev. 19:13). In Him, God's revelation is complete, for "He is the radiance of [God's] glory and the exact representation of His nature" (Heb. 1:3). No more prophecies about God were necessary, for God Himself had appeared, born in Bethlehem: "And the Word became flesh, and dwelt among us, and we beheld His glory, glory as of the only begotten from the Father, full of grace and truth" (Jn. 1:14). Christmas is a celebration of the Incarnate Word. Let Christ have the final word in your life. Let His Word, the Bible, have absolute sway over your heart.

HERAS conception marks our first point of existence, the eternal Son of God had an active part in His incarnation – He "partook of flesh and blood." And He did so for this express reason: "That He might become a merciful and faithful high priest in things pertaining to God, to make propitiation for the sins of the people." The Son of God came to earth to be our High Priest. Of this duty, our text tells us, He would be "faithful". A thousand years before Christ, the Lord promised, "But I will raise up for Myself a faithful priest who will do according to what is in My heart and in My soul; and I will build him an enduring house, and he will walk before My anointed always" (1 Sam. 2:35). Christ is our faithful High Priest; He alone holds that unique position. "For there is one God, and one Mediator also between God and men, the man Christ Jesus" (1 Tim. 2:5). "He was faithful to Him who appointed Him" (Heb. 3:2, cf. Heb. 3:5-6). Were Christ unfaithful in His high priestly duties then perhaps we could lose our salvation, but even now He intercedes on our behalf: "Hence, also, He is able to save forever those who draw near to God through Him, since He always lives to make intercession for them" (Heb. 7:25). "Christ intervenes between God and man, not merely to sue for peace, but armed with power to do all that is necessary to establish it. ... He labors in things pertaining to God and in things pertaining to man, in the objective legal sphere, and in the subjective moral sphere. In the former He propitiates the just displeasure of God by expiating the guilt of sin, makes intercessions for those whom the Father has given Him, and actually makes their persons and services acceptable to God. And in the latter He reveals to men the truth concerning God and their relation to Him with the conditions of acceptable service, persuades and enables them to receive the truth, and directs and sustains them in all circumstances of life, so as to perfect their deliverance" (Berkhof).







ND the angel said to her, 'Do not be afraid, Mary; for you have found favor with God. And behold, you will conceive in your womb, and bear a son, and you shall name Him Jesus. He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Most High; and the Lord God will give Him the throne of His father David; and He will reign over the house of Jacob forever; and His kingdom will have no end" (Lk. 1:30-33). "Mary treasured up all these things, pondering them in her heart" (Lk. 2:19). Here was Mary's dilemma: The angel had told her that her Son was a king – she had God's word on it. But everything Mary experienced seemed to point the other direction: The angel said, "He will be great," yet Mary gave birth to Jesus in the worst of conditions. The angel said, "He will be called the Son of the Most High," instead they said He was possessed by Beelzebub (Mk. 3:22). The angel said He would reign on the throne of David forever, but she saw Him, not reign forever, but die the most cruel of deaths in the prime of life. She saw no crown and no kingdom, only hardship and persecution. Which would she believe, her experience or God's Word? Which do you believe - the Word of God, or your feelings and experiences? Christian, we walk by faith not by sight (2 Cor. 5:7). Now faith is ... the conviction of things not seen" (Heb. 11:1). We are not waiting for Christ to be crowned; He is, right now, the "King of kings" (Rev. 17:14, 19:16). His kingdom, now invisible and spiritual (Lk. 17:21. KJV), will one day be established on earth (Dan. 2:35; 2 Pet. 3:13). Treasure these things in your heart, but proclaim them with your mouth: The King of kings is born in Bethlehem! Let Him reign in your heart today!






EAR again the angel's message, "Do not be afraid; for behold, I bring you good news of a great joy which shall be for all the people; for today in the city of David there has been born for you a Savior, who is Christ the Lord" (Lk. 2:10-11). As we have seen, Jesus is the Christ, the Anointed One – anointed, i.e. baptized with, the Holy Spirit. "And after being baptized, Jesus went up immediately from the water; and behold, the heavens were opened, and he saw the Spirit of God descending as a dove, and coming upon Him" (Mt. 3:16). That answers the misconception within the Church today that a person can receive Jesus without receiving the Holy Spirit or that one can be baptized into Christ without being baptized in the Holy Spirit. Impossible! Jesus, who lives inside of you, is the Christ, the Anointed One – anointed and baptized with the Holy Spirit. Moreover, John the Baptist said, "He [Jesus] will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire" (Mt. 3:11). How? By coming into your heart: "He who believes in Me, as the Scripture said, 'From his innermost being shall flow rivers of living water" (Jn. 7:38). "For by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, whether slaves or free, and we were all made to drink of one Spirit" (1 Cor. 12:13). The Spirit's baptism and filling are not the exception, but the rule of the Christian life (Eph. 5:18). Dead, dry Christianity is a contradiction in terms – it is no Christianity! Anyone that does not have the Spirit does not belong to Christ (Rom. 8:9). Are we Christian's in name only, or have we been sealed by the Spirit? (2 Cor. 1:22; Eph. 1:13; Eph. 4:30). Are we worshiping an unbaptized and unanointed Jesus. Heaven forbid! Jesus is the Christ!








AN is not worthy to receive worship (Acts 10:25-26, 14:11-14) nor are angels (Rev. 19:10, 22:8-9), but "worthy is the Lamb" (Rev. 5:12), God's anointed Prophet, Priest, and King, of our most passionate praises! See how the magi worshiped Christ at His birth: "And they came into the house and saw the Child with Mary His mother; and they fell down and worshiped Him; and opening their treasures they presented to Him gifts of gold and frankincense and myrrh" (Mt. 2:11). These oriental astrologers, called "magi" (magicians), travelled far to present their expensive gifts and worship Christ. How far are you willing to go, Christian? True worship is sacrificial. If they, steeped in astrology and mysticism, made such sacrifices, how much more ought God's own people? And look at their gifts: not trifles, but a costly offering. If Christ is worth anything He is worth everything. Is your worship one of convenience or is it costing you something? True worship is costly. David said, "I will not offer burnt offerings to the Lord my God which cost me nothing" (2 Sam. 24:24). Let us be like the woman who emptied the alabaster vial of very costly perfume upon Jesus' head (Mt. 26:7-13), and give unto Christ not the last, but the first, our best and not the worst. And look at the posture of the magi before the Lord: "they fell down and worshiped Him." O that God's people today would prostrate themselves before the Lord. "Humble yourselves in the presence of the Lord" (Jam. 4:10). They bowed down to worship. True worship requires humility, submission, and a contrite heart (Psa. 51:17). "Come, let us worship and bow down; let us kneel before the Lord our Maker" (Psa. 95:6). Dear Christian, worship the Lord this Christmas as He has prescribed: "with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might" (Deut. 6:5).









ND God said to Moses, 'I AM WHO I AM'; and He said, Thus you shall say to the sons of Israel, 'I AM has sent me to you'" (Ex. (A3:14). Of all of God's names, this is revered by many as the most holy. Formed by the four Hebrew letters YHVH, called the Tetragrammaton, the name is probably pronounced "Yahveh" (colloquial form: "Jehovah"), which translated means "I AM," referring to God's eternal Self-existence. God eternally is, without need of anything external to Himself. Jesus said, "Unless you believe that I AM, you shall die in your sins" (Jn. 8:24 – Greek, ego eimi, literally: "I I AM") and again He said, "Truly, truly, I say to you, before Abraham was born, I AM" (Jn. 8:58). What then is the incarnation, but the birth of the I AM in human flesh! During the intertestamental period (i.e. the time between Old & New Testaments), the Jews began the practice of saying, "Lord" (Heb: Adonai) in place of the Hebrew name, I AM, because they believed the latter too holy to speak. Hence, to the Jews, Lord meant God. The New Testament writers, being of Hebrew extraction, intended the same meaning by the Greek word, kurios (Lord). "If you confess with your mouth Jesus as Lord [i.e. I AM], and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you shall be saved (Rom. 10:9) and four verses later, "Whoever will call upon the name of the Lord will be saved" (Rom. 10:13), quoted from Joel 2:32: "And it will come about that whoever calls on the name of the Lord [I AM] will be delivered." Preceding Christ's birth, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream, saying, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife; for that which has been conceived in her is of the Holy Spirit. And she will bear a Son; and you shall call His name Jesus [which means "Yahveh saves"], for it is He [i.e. Yahveh Jesus] who will save His people from their sins" (Mt. 1:21). Here then is a profound mystery: In Bethlehem, the I AM, the eternally Self-subsistent



E celebrate Christmas not just because "God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son," nor only because Christ has given us His promise "that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have eternal life" (Jn. 3:16). Indeed, our celebration of such promises would all be for nought, if Christ has not the power to carry them out. "How vain would be the eternal counsels, if power did not step in to execute them. Without power His mercy would be but feeble pity, His promises an empty sound, His threatenings a mere scarecrow. God's power is like Himself: infinite, eternal, incomprehensible; it can neither be checked, restrained, nor frustrated by the creature" (Stephen Charnock). We celebrate Christmas because the Lord is not only willing to save (2 Pet. 3:9), but He is also able to do it. Scripture contrasts the Lord, who is infinitely able (Dan. 3:17-18; Rom. 4:21; 2 Cor. 9:8; 2 Tim. 1:12; Heb. 2:18, 7:25; Jude 1:24-25), with man-made idols unable to save or assist those who worship them (Psa. 115:3-8; Jer. 2:27-28, 10:3-16, 14:22, 44:11-20; Hab. 2:18). Let us remember then that this little Child, born in a manger, is the Lord, "very God of very God" (Nicene Creed), who makes good on His promise of salvation, for He has the power to do it, "and being fully assured that what He had promised, He was able also to perform" (Rom. 4:21), "for I am watching over My word to perform it," says the Lord (Jer. 1:12). "And this is the promise which He Himself made to us: eternal life" (1 Jn. 2:25). Therefore, "Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for He who promised is faithful" (Heb 10:23). Remember, "power belongs to God" (Psa. 62:11), therefore "Not one word of all the good words which the Lord your God spoke concerning you has failed; all have been fulfilled for you" (Josh. 23:14; cf. 1 Kgs. 8:56). Herein lies our celebration of Christmas: God sent His Son armed with these two: the promise of eternal life (Jn. 11:25-26) and the power to bring it to pass (Jn. 5:21).



ABIES are adored because they are cute, and yet we do not adore Jesus at His birth because He was cute. Indeed, "He has no stately form or majesty that we should look upon Him, nor appearance that we should be attracted to Him" (Isa. 53:2). What then has inspired so many songs of His birth? And what causes men and angels to look with profound adoration and great awe at the incarnation? It is the same thing, I pray, that you will see this Christmas as you think upon the tiny occupant of that manger: That little Baby was Lord of all! See how the Scriptures extol Christ's Lordship: He is called "the Lord of peace" (2 Thess. 3:16), "the Lord of glory" (1 Cor. 2:6-8), "Lord of the Sabbath" (Mt. 12:8), "the Lord of lords" (Rev. 17:14), and "Lord of all" (Rom. 10:12). Someone has said, Jesus is Lord of all, or He is not Lord at all." So then, His Lordship in your life hangs on one of those two prepositions. Charles Spurgeon, pastor and teacher in the late 1800's, wrote:

"I cannot conceive it possible for anyone to receive Christ as Savior and yet not to receive Him as Lord. A man who is really saved by grace does not need to be told that he is under solemn obligations to serve Christ. The new life within him tells him that. Instead of regarding it as a burden, he gladly surrenders himself - body, soul, and spirit - to the Lord who has redeemed him, reckoning this to be his reasonable service."






S we have seen in our previous studies, to say, "Jesus is Lord," is a declaration of Christ's deity. So then, to understand the Lordship of Jesus Christ, we must study the attributes of God. Scripture declares, "God is love" (1 Jn. 4:8,16) upon which the reader should pause and meditate: Consider the infinite, eternal, and unchanging character of God, who is love of no lesser degree than His character. Now consider Christ, incarnate God – the embodiment of love, love incarnate, alien love - foreign, incomprehensible (Jn. 1:5). Christ's birth was an act of love (Jn. 3:16); His life was poured out in love (Phil. 2:3-5); and His death was love's crowning achievement: "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends" (Jn. 15:13). "God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us" (Rom. 5:8). "Amazing love, how can it be, that Thou my God would die for me" (Hymn). The Lord says, "I have loved you with an everlasting love; therefore I have drawn you with lovingkindness" (Jer. 31:3). The comprehension of such love elicits the psalmist's highest praises: "Thy lovingkindness, O Lord, extends to the heavens, Thy faithfulness reaches to the skies" (Psa. 36:5). "For as high as the heavens are above the earth, so great is His lovingkindness toward those who fear Him" (Psa. 103:11). "All the paths of the Lord are lovingkindness and truth to those who keep His covenant and His testimonies" (Psa. 25:10). "The lovingkindness of God endures all day long" (Psa. 52:1). "His lovingkindness is everlasting" (41x). Therefore, "goodness and lovingkindness will follow me all the days of my life" (Psa. 23:6). "It is good to give thanks to the Lord, and to sing praises to Thy name, O Most High; to declare Thy lovingkindness in the morning, and Thy faithfulness by night" (Psa. 92:1-2). Christmas is about the Father's redeeming love (Jn. 3:16), Christ's sacrificial love (Jn. 15:13; Eph. 5:25), and the Spirit's indwelling love (Gal. 5:22-23). Make this Christmas a celebration of this great Trinitarian love.


e have in the verses above, Jesus' love on display. Christ, "the Hound of Heaven," relentlessly pursues the object of His affection, namely His people. Do you belong to Christ? Once that has been established, O what joy brightens the heart upon discovering Jesus is the omnipotent "Lover of my soul," to coin Wesley's phrase. The incarnation, which we celebrate at Christmas, let the Hound out of the cage, so to speak, and who can stop Him now! Look again at the obstacles listed in our passage which Christ's love overcomes: Various kinds of tribulation are listed first. Yes, "In this world you will have tribulation," but neither tribulation, nor distress, nor persecution, nor famine, nor nakedness, nor peril, nor the sword can separate us from His love, for He has "overcome the world" (Jn. 16:33). Nor shall life nor death keep us from Him, for He is the Prince of life (Acts 3:125) and the Conqueror of death (Rom. 6:9; 1 Cor. 15:54-57; 2 Tim. 1:10; Heb. 2:14). And has He not told us He will go with us through the valley of the shadow of death? (Psa. 23:4). Can angels or principalities withhold Him? No, He has "triumphed over them" (Col. 2:15; Jn. 12:31; 1 Jn. 3:8). Shall anything past, present, or future restrain His love? Never, for He loves us "with an everlasting love" (Jer. 31:3). Height cannot separate us from Him, for His lovingkindness extends to the heavens, His faithfulness reaches to the skies (Psa. 36:5). Depth cannot undermine His love, for He has humbled Himself (Phil. 2:3-8), to the lowest depth (Psa. 139:9-10), to the "uttermost" (Heb. 7:25, KJV). Neither shall any created thing stand between us, for He is the Creator of all things (Jn. 1:3; Col 1:16), who upholds all things by the word of His power (Heb. 1:3; cf. Col. 1:17). Dear Christian, this Christmas revel in the unstoppable, unquenchable, 6

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

OTICE again the posture of the magi at Christ's nativity: "They came into the house and saw the Child with Mary His mother; and they fell down and worshiped Him; and opening their treasures they presented to Him gifts of gold and frankincense and myrrh" (Mt. 2:11). What a picture – grown men bowing down before a newborn baby! Of course we know this was no ordinary Child, but the Lord of all Creation! Out of all the multitudes of mankind, these magi bowed down and worshiped, and yet there is coming a day in which the multitudes too will bow down before Him. Then every knee will bow and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord! Christ's own people will do so willingly, reverently, joyfully: They "will fall down before Him who sits on the throne, and will worship Him who lives forever and ever, and will cast their crowns before the throne, saying, 'Worthy art Thou, our Lord and our God, to receive glory and honor and power; for Thou didst create all things, and because of Thy will they existed, and were created" (Rev. 4:10-11). Not so for Christ's enemies: Face to face with the One they have rejected, they will finally admit the one thing they could never before bring themselves to say, "Jesus Christ is Lord!" Our confession of Christ will break into spontaneous worship; theirs into mourning (Rev. 1:7; Mt. 13:41-42). Christ's people humble themselves under the mighty hand of God (1 Pet. 5:6); Christ's enemies are brought to their knees, humbled under His mighty hand. Satan himself will be there kneeling, trembling, confessing Christ as Lord – his last words before he is thrown into the lake of fire. "But to this one I will look, to him who is humble and contrite of spirit, and who trembles at My word," says the Lord (Isa. 66:2). Worship Christ the Lord!



HE Pharisees had reduced the worship of God to hundreds of "do's" and "don'ts", but Jesus came to reform worship. They rebuked Jesus for doing works of mercy and necessity on the Sabbath (Mt. 12:1-12), but Jesus said, "the Son of Man is Lord of the Sabbath" (Mt. 12:8). Some take that to mean that there is no longer any Sabbath principle whatsoever, but Jesus did not say that. The Pharisees were worshiping the rules of the Sabbath and not the Lord of the Sabbath, who stood in the flesh before them! The Lord's Day is our day of corporate worship under the New Covenant (Acts 2:1, 20:7; Rev. 1:10). "Let us consider how to stimulate one another to love and good deeds, not forsaking our own assembling together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another; and all the more, as you see the day drawing near" (Heb. 10:24-25). Do you wish to truly honor Christ this Christmas? Then honor Him for who He is - Lord, yes, even Lord of the Sabbath. And if He is Lord of the Sabbath, then let us "call the Sabbath a delight" (Isa. 58:14). Token worship, once a year, will satisfy stone idols and man-made gods, but not the Living God! Honor Him on His Day, "the Lord's Day," when His people congregate to worship the Lord of the Sabbath, for "God takes His stand in His own congregation" (Psa. 82:1). "Praise the Lord! Sing to the Lord a new song, and His praise in the congregation of the godly ones. (Psa. 149:1, cf. Psa. 35:18). The Lord promises, "If because of the sabbath, you turn your foot from doing your own pleasure on My holy day, and call the sabbath a delight, the holy day of the Lord honorable, and shall honor it, desisting from your own ways, from seeking your own pleasure, and speaking your own word, then you will take delight in the Lord, and I will make you ride on the heights of the earth..." (Isa. 58:13-14).















OD is transcendent, "separated from sinners" (Heb. 7:26), who alone "dwells in unapproachable light" (1 Tim. 6:16). But God's separateness and unapproachablness only enriches the great wonder surrounding the incarnation; that this transcendent God is at the same time in vital union with His people, joined with them in their humanity. What a mysteriously wonderful word is "Immanuel" - the transcendent God, immediately immanent, God with us, in Christ. Christmas, then, is a celebration of God's solidarity with His people. For "since the children share in flesh and blood, He Himself likewise also partook of the same" (Heb. 2:14). "The Word became flesh, and dwelt among us" (Jn. 1:14), "taking the form of a bond-servant, and being made in the likeness of men" (Phil. 2:6-8). For "He had to be made like His brethren in all things ... to make propitiation for the sins of the people" (Heb. 2:17), that He Himself might bear our sins in His body on the cross, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness (1 Pet. 2:24). Christian, this week meditate on that name, "Immanuel," and consider again who it is that is with us – God with us! The name is derived from the Hebrew "im" meaning with, and "el" meaning God, emphasizing God's majesty and power: "God [Heb: el] is exalted in power" (Job 36:22). So then, this majestic, all-powerful God is with us, in Christ – Immanuel. Let your meditations upon Him melt away your worries and fears, for "God [in Christ] is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble ... the Lord of hosts is with us" (Psa. 46:1,7). "Yea though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil" (Psa. 23:4). Why? – Because "Thou art with me," in Christ, Immanuel. Yes, God's people are distinguished by God's presence: "For what great nation is there that has a god so near to it as is the Lord our God whenever we call on Him?" (Deut. 4:7). "The Lord is near to all who call upon Him, to all who call upon Him in truth" (Psa. 145:18). Christmas is a reminder that God is with His people. "Do not fear, for I am with you; do not anxiously look about you, for I am your God. I will strengthen you, surely I will help you, surely I will uphold you with My righteous right hand" (Isa. 41:10). \circ


"And she brought forth her firstborn Son, and wrapped Him in swaddling clothes, and laid Him in a manger" - Luke 2:7

HRIST is the King of kings, and yet, at His birth, they laid Him not in a palace, but a manger – an animal's food trough! O, how low He stooped to save you and me! The infinite, became an infant. The One who upholds the universe (Heb. 1:3; Col. 1:17), Himself was carried in a woman's arms. There He was, Jehovah Jireh, nursing at a woman's breast! From earth's standpoint, Jesus was born, but from heaven's vantage point, "He emptied Himself, taking the form of a bond-servant, and being made in the likeness of men. And being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself..." (Phil. 2:7-8). Notice also the announcement of His birth was made, not to kings and priests, but to common shepherds in the field. "And the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid; for behold, I bring you good news of a great joy which shall be for all the people; for today in the city of David there has been born for you a Savior, who is Christ the Lord" (Lk. 2:10). Yes, such news is "for all the people"; that is to say, for all classes of men, "for there is no partiality with God" (Rom. 2:11), "For though the Lord is exalted, yet He regards the lowly" (Psa. 138:6). Yes, He even chooses "the foolish things of the world to shame the wise" and "the weak things of the world to shame the things which are strong" (1 Cor. 1:27). Consider too, Christ's genealogy according to the flesh. In Jesus' ancestry, we read of Judah's incest with Tamar (Gen. 38:6-30) and David's adultery with Bathsheba (2 Sam. 11). In Christ's ancestral line flowed the blood of Rahab, the Canaanite harlot (Josh. 2) and Ruth, the Moabite (Ruth 1:4), whose people were accursed (Deut. 23:3-5). Yes, Jesus is akin to the lowly and the fallen and He will show His love to the poorest and most ignoble that turn away from their sin to Him (cf. Mt. 21:31). "For thus says the high and exalted One who lives forever, whose name is Holy, 'I dwell on a high and holy place, and also with the contrite and lowly of spirit in order to revive the spirit of the lowly and to revive the heart of the contrite" (Isa. 57:15).

"And she gave birth to her first-born Son; and she wrapped Him in cloths, and laid Him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the inn." – Luke 2:7

HE photographs of presidents, kings, queens, millionaires, and world leaders grace the lobbies of some of the world's grandest hotels, boasting of their distinguished clientele. But in Bethlehem, in an unknown little inn, no sign ever read, "Jesus once slept here." Our text tells us that they "laid Him in a manger, because there was no room in the inn." Had Caesar, or Herod, or the High Priest paid a visit, you can be sure a room would have been made available, but when the King of kings came, there was no room. That pretty much summarizes the world's reception of Christ – no room. "Give us a conquering hero, or a great athlete, or a self-made millionaire that we may admire, but not a Savior. For only sinners need a Savior," is the world's attitude. But certainly we Christians are not so inhospitable are we? Jesus said, "Behold I stand at the door and knock" (Rev. 3:20); let us hurry then to not keep Him waiting! Yes, I know many have used this verse to witness to unbelievers, but it was actually spoken, by Christ, to the Church. It speaks more of fellowship than salvation. Dear Christian, each day Christ stands at the door of your heart and knocks. He seeks to have fellowship with you. And each day we either open the door, or hang out the "Do not disturb" sign. Which are you doing amidst all of the preparations and festivities that surround this holiday? Is there room for Christ in your thoughts today? "I have no time," says one. Then make time. "But I can't do everything!" Then do one thing – spend time with Christ. "My schedule is full." Then clear your schedule. "But other work and preparations will go undone!" Let them go undone then (Lk. 10:38-42). "But they are very important!" He is more important. Do you have room! That is the one great question you must answer today – and you cannot answer it with just words, but with a schedule that gives Him first place in your life (Col. 1:18).


"'Behold, the virgin shall be with child, and shall bear a Son, and they shall call His name Immanuel,' which translated means, 'God with us.'" – Matthew 1:23

N the Old Testament, David exclaimed, "The Lord is for me; I will not fear; What can man do to me?" (Psa. 118:6). Paul echoes this theme in the New Testament when he says, "Who will bring a charge against God's elect?" (Rom. 8:33). If God is for us, who can be against us?" (Rom. 8:31). What could be more comforting to God's people than the knowledge that God is for us? Just this: This same God is also with us. To have someone that is for your cause is one thing, but to have one who is with you in that cause is quite another. And when that One is God the implications are tremendous. God contends for His people (Isa. 51:22); He fights for His people (Neh. 4:20); He is a refuge for His people (Joel 3:16); yes, "The Lord has done great things for us" (Psa. 126:3). But beyond all of that, He is with us in our struggle. He is not only for our side, He is also on our side. Luther's Mighty Fortress says, "Were not the right man on our side, Our striving would be losing ... Christ Jesus, it is He!" The Philistines' hope and security was in their champion Goliath, albeit a false hope (1 Sam. 17:4ff); how much more secure are God's people with Immanuel in our camp – for "the Lord is with me like a dread champion; therefore my persecutors will stumble and not prevail" (Jer. 20:11). "One puts to flight a thousand and two put ten thousand to flight" (Deut. 32:30; cf. Josh. 23:10), for one with God is a majority! Therefore, "I will fear no evil, for Thou art with me" (Psa. 23:4). Because of the incarnation God is with us now, not just in spirit, but in flesh - Immanuel, God with us, forever joined with us in our humanity. Are you compassed by worries or fears? Turn your eyes upon Jesus, Immanuel, God with us, and sing with the psalmist, "The Lord is my light and my salvation; Whom shall I fear? The Lord is the defense of my life; Whom shall I dread? When evildoers came upon me to devour my flesh, my adversaries and my enemies, they stumbled and fell. Though a host encamp against me, my heart will not fear; though war arise against me, in spite of this I shall be confident" (Psa. 27:1-3).

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


Good News Of a Great Joy

"And the angel said to them, 'Do not be afraid; for behold, I bring you good news of a great joy which shall be for all the people; for today in the city of David there has been born for you a Savior, who is Christ the Lord." – Luke 2:10-11

ERE are two thoughts that ought to be closely connected in our minds: [1] In God's presence is fulness of joy (Psa. 16:11), and [2] Jesus is Immanuel, God with us, the fullest possible expression of God's presence with His people. The implications are clear: Since God's presence brings "fulness of joy" and "all the fulness of Deity dwells in bodily form" in Christ (Col. 2:9), then the fullest possible expression of joy, true joy, can only be experienced in Christ, Immanuel. Joy, then, is one of the chief birth effects of the incarnation. Jesus' birth is "good news of a great joy"! Family gatherings and exchanging gifts can be the source of much happiness at Christmas, but the true joy of Christmas and every other day of the year is Christ Himself. He is both the object and source of our joy. God's people "rejoice in the Lord" (Psa. 35:9); He is our "exceeding joy" (Psa. 43:4), declares the psalmist. Christ has been "anointed with the oil of joy" above His fellows (Psa. 45:7) – He is the epitome of joy! We cannot experience joy apart from Christ, but rather we enter into His joy (Mt. 25:21, 23). That is, joy increases proportional to our nearness to Him. Happiness, on the other hand, is dependent upon circumstances (happenstance), people, and possessions. The word happiness stems from the Middle English word "hap". If perhaps things are going my way, then I am happy, but if not, then I am unhappy. While happiness often takes us on a great rollercoaster ride of emotions, joy is based upon the Lord who never changes (Heb. 13:8). Christian, is your mood this Christmas based upon the expectation of gifts and the way other people treat you, or is it based upon Christ? Remember "the joy of the Lord is your strength" (Neh. 8:10).










"And this will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling clothes, and lying in a manger. And suddenly there appeared with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among men with whom He is pleased.'" – Luke 2:12-14

EVEN hundred years before His birth, that little baby, wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manager, was spoken of by the prophet Isaiah! "For a Child will be born to us, a Son will be given to us; and the government will rest on His shoulders; and His name will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Eternal Father, Prince of Peace. There will be no end to the increase of His government or of peace" (Isa. 9:6-7). Jesus is Immanuel, God with us, or as Isaiah notes, "Mighty God" with us! Furthermore, this Mighty God, Immanuel, is the Prince of Peace and it was of peace that the angels sang at His birth: "And suddenly there appeared with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among men with whom He is pleased" (Lk. 2:12-14). Jesus "is our peace" (Eph. 2:14): "Having been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (Rom. 5:1). Jesus said, "Peace I leave with you; My peace I give to you; not as the world gives, do I give to you. Let not your heart be troubled, nor let it be fearful" (Jn. 14:27). Christmas will come and go but Christ's peace lingers on in the hearts of those whose mind is stayed on Him (Isa. 26:3). "Now may the Lord of peace Himself continually grant you peace in every circumstance" (2 Thess. 3:16), and "let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts" (Col. 3:15). The "peace that passes all understanding" (Phil. 4:7) is borne out of a deep belief in Jesus' statement, "I am with you always, even to the end of the age" (Mt. 28:20) – Immanuel, God with us, bears the fruit of peace in the lives of His people.









Immanuel: Green Candle

T His birth, they hailed Him as "Immanuel", which translated means "God with us" (Matt. 1:23) -- the name that perhaps best describes Jesus' incarnation. Yet God has always been with His people (Deut.. 31:6, 8; Psa. 23:4; Isa. 43:2). The profound difference of course is that, at Christ's birth, God "became flesh" (Jn. 1:14). His deity remained undiminished, His divine attributes undisturbed, nevertheless He became a Man! - And that, not for a time, or an age, but forever! Christ is forever the God-Man. He was born bodily, He died and was raised bodily, and He lives and reigns forevermore in a glorified human body! His solidarity with us was no passing thing. He did not secure our redemption and then disassociate Himself from mankind. Herein lies our future: "Behold, the tabernacle of God is among men, and He shall dwell among them, and they shall be His people, and God Himself shall be among them" (Rev. 21:3). Throughout all eternity God shall dwell among us spiritually and, in Christ, bodily, as in Eden (Gen. 3:8). Paradise shall be restored and Eden (which means "delight") reclaimed. By far, Eden's greatest delight shall be Christ's personal presence, for "we shall see Him just as He is" (1 Jn. 3:2). This Christmas, as you ponder the ineffable truths of the incarnation, remember that God joined Himself with our humanity, specifically with you, Christian – forever – so that nothing, no nothing, can separate us! (Rom. 8:39). He is ours and we are His. Jesus was, and is, and forever shall be, Immanuel, God with us!









N a cold, dark night 2000 years ago, a great light appeared in the heavens, leading wise men and shepherds to Bethlehem. And there they beheld something greater still - a brighter, purer, holy light, before whom stars pale in glory. Wrapped in cloths, lying in a manger, was "the light of the world" (Jn. 8:12), "the radiance of God's glory" (Heb. 1:3), "the Sunrise from on high" (Lk. 1:78). Yet, these titles, ascribed to Christ, escape our understanding unless we personalize there meaning. To know that Jesus is the light of the world is one thing, but to say, "The Lord is my light and my salvation" (Psa. 27:1) is quite another. Yes, Jesus is the light of the world, but is He your light? Have you let His piercing rays penetrate the darkness that is in your own heart and expose the hidden motives and impure attitudes that lurk there? (Psa. 90:8). Is He a lamp to your feet, and a light to your path? (Psa. 119:105). And can the world see His brightness in your joyful demeanor? - This is true Christmas cheer, dear friend. The lights and glitter of Christmas are no substitute; Christ is the light of Christmas! So then, as we commemorate His birth, may our countenance be brightened, not by packages and bows, bells and lights, but by Christ Himself.



ERRY Christmas! Today we celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ – the single most important event in all of human history, next to His death on the cross. When we commemorate Christ's birth, we look back upon the same event the Old Testament people of God looked forward to. Christ is the pivot around which the Old and New Testaments, yes, all of human history revolves. History truly is His-story. For millennia, the prophets foretold Christ's coming: "Behold, the days are coming,' declares the Lord, 'When I shall raise up for David a righteous Branch; and He will reign as King and act wisely and do justice and righteousness in the land" (Jer. 23:5). "Then it will come about in that day that the nations will resort to the root of Jesse, who will stand as a Signal for the peoples; and His resting place will be glorious" (Isa. 11:10). Then, after thousands of years, came the joyful announcement, "Behold, I bring you good news of a great joy which shall be for all the people; for today in the city of David there has been born for you a Savior, who is Christ the Lord'" (Lk. 2:10-11). No longer would it be said, "the days are coming" or "in that day," but rather, "today!" But even though the Old and New Testaments revolve equally around Christ, we stand in the preferred position, looking back upon His birth rather than forward – "For truly I say to you, that many prophets and righteous men desired to see what you see, and did not see it; and to hear what you hear, and did not hear it." (Mt. 13:17). "All these died in faith, without receiving the promises, but having seen them and having welcomed them from a distance" (Heb. 11:13; cf. 1 Pet. 1:10-11). Prophecy has become history and we are privileged to say in the past tense: "God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life" (Jn. 3:16).


